Asian Green Mussel Follow-up

The invasive Asian Green Mussel [*Perna viridis* (Linnaeus, 1758)] has been confirmed living in Georgia waters for the first time. During the first week of October a 70 mm. specimen was found in a trap set off the Georgia Department of Natural Resources Dock in the port of Brunswick. The size of the specimen indicates that it is about a year-and-a-half old and thus had survived the cold winter temperatures. Subsequently

on October 21^{st} one small green mussel was found at the mouth of the Savannah River – about 80 miles further north along the Georgia coast.

After reading the report of this species being found living on the south St. Marys River Jetty by your editor during August, Jacksonville Shell Club member and Cumberland Island, Georgia resident, Carol Ruckdeschel searched the north St. Marys River Jetty (southern Cumberland Island) on September 26^{th,} but was unable to find any specimens. A follow-up visit is planned.

A computer projection by the U. S. Geological Survey estimates that the mussel will migrate as far south as the Florida Keys, west to Texas and north to North Carolina.

The mollusk's impacts - both economic and environmental are still unknown. What is known is that the fast-growing mussels, which have been known to reach upwards of six inches long (about 150 mm.) have become a nuisance in the Tampa area, fouling water intake pipes at power plants, sinking navigational buoys, and carpeting boats and piers.

Mountain People Continue In The Pursuit Of Haywood Co. Terrestrials By Harry G. Lee

Billie and Paul Brown have just returned from a visit to "The Cabin," located at about 3500 ft. on the flank of James Mt., near Asheville, North Carolina. For the first time. Billie was kind enough to retrieve a living slug to share with club members. Along with this were a few other snails taken alive near the retreat where Paul and she have spent many relaxed and enjoyable vacations. The Jananuary-February, 1990 Shell-O-Gram carried an article detailing the 37 species, 18 previously unreported from the county, collected by the two of them (and on two occasions with the help of the late Bonnie Holiman). Along with an account of the larger species, it analyzed the retrieval of 540 specimens of 28 "micro-" species from a soil sample obtained by Billie and sorted by the writer. Over the last thirteen years, some emendations have become appropriate (including the availability of codified vernacular names, generic reassignments, one date change, typo-corrections, and the reidentification of one Stenotrema species). The updated list (increased to 38 taxa by virtue of the slug discovery) and illustrations of the five living snails Billie brought home complete this little report.


